1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Ramkrishna Nagar College, situated in a remote corner of the district of Karimganj, Assam, falls under the jurisdiction of Ratabari LA-I (Reserved) and MP-I (Constituency). The demography of the land comprises SC, ST, OBC, MOBC, EX-TGL and the minority community among others. The natural beauty of the college campus is enhanced by the surrounding hilly tracts with the lush green tea gardens on the outskirts which add to the area's charm and grandeur. Ramkrishna Nagar College is situated at a distance of 55 kms. from the district headquarter. It is situated on a 36 Bigha hilly tract of land donated by the neighbouring Higher Secondary School, Ramkrishna Vidyapith. The College came into being on 12 January 1964, owing to the zealous efforts of a steering committee led by Late B.N. Mukherjee, former Minister of Health, Government of Assam. This endeavour was also augmented by the sincere help and cooperation of dedicated educationists, elites and patrons of the locality, and ultimately this lighthouse of learning – the only premier institution of higher education of LA Lok Sabha Ratabari Constituency – came into existence. The college was subsequently brought under Deficit Grant-in-Aid System in 1974 by the sincere efforts of late Suranjan Nandi, former minister, Government of Assam. Later on, it was included under Government Provincialisation Act, 2005. The college has been registered under Sec. 2(f) and 12(b) of UGC Act, 1956 since March 2000. Initially, the college was affiliated to Gauhati University and in 1994 it was newly affiliated to Assam University, Silchar. Being a premier co-educational institution, Ramkrishna Nagar College has been at the forefront of advancement of higher education and other co-curricular activities since the day of its inception. During its glorious journey of 59 years, the college has maintained a legacy of producing prodigious students in all fields. Today with the changes in the entire teaching-learning process, our college has accepted the challenges of qualitative higher education with its firm determination and enthusiasm. At present, the college offers HS and Degree courses in Arts and Science streams. It has a student capacity of 1500 and the total number of teachers is 25.

Vision

It is the endeavour of Ramkrishna Nagar College to project the overall development of the society in its social, ethical, spiritual and intellectual perspectives. Our vision is to create knowledge based human resources with a scientific temper and team spirit so as to make our students competent and ethically strong future citizens who can successfully face the challenges of life and eventually contribute to the overall progression of the society.

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 is clearly reflected in the mission and vision of the college for providing education to all by ensuring the quality of being fair and impartial increasing access to education. The college maintains an excellent teacher-student relationship. Team work and leadership qualities are promoted through assignments, class seminars, educational tours etc. as parts of a wide range of extension activities. Hence, the college has come up with a vision for preparing the students to acquire necessary knowledge and skills which will in effect strengthen the socio-economic base of the local areas. The college's vision also involves enlightening the learners with relevant knowledge and developing them through various co-curricular activities conducted by various cells such as NSS, NCC Women's Cell, Community extension services cell and others, involving the students to sensitize the community. Thus, the overall vision of the college can be summarised as follows.

1. To inculcate rational thinking and scientific spirit among the students in order to make them aware of

the emerging issues related to environment, population growth, gender equality and so on.

2. To strengthen the academic and physical infrastructure for achieving excellence in teaching, research and outreach programmes that would be comparable to global standards.
3. To promote awareness programmes relevant to the socio-economic needs of the society, the nation in general and the region in particular.
4. In addition to the regular academic curriculum, the college aims to promote skill-oriented programmes and to undertake the activities for all-round development of the rural people.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The institutional strength of Ramkrishna Nagar College can be highlighted in terms of its student-oriented practices which aim to provide quality education to the students and to project the excellence in education, empowering personalities and developing responsible members of the society. In this regard, the following activities of the college can be taken as representing its institutional strength.

1. To achieve academic excellence and promote innovation through mutual co-operation, our college has signed MoU with reputed Institutions of Higher Education like Swami Vivekananda College, Karimganj; West Silchar College, Cachar and Karimganj College, Karimganj.
2. There is a provision of Mentor-Mentee group in the college in order to mentor certain number of students under each and every faculty member.
3. An important strength of the college is the maintenance of equity in the male-female student ratio, especially in the last five years where female students have out-numbered male students.

4. Our College has a career Guidance and counselling cell to update the students with information of different avenues of career and placements field.
5. The college library has set-up a new landmark by installing Barcode Automation system with Smart Display Attendance system.
6. In order to inculcate the values of National unity and integration, our college constantly inspires the students to enrol themselves in NCC and NSS wings.
7. To solve the crises of communication for the girl students coming from the remotest parts, our college has a well-equipped and secure Girls' Hostel with 50 seat capacity.
8. Our college has started new enterprises by arranging cutting and knitting Training Programme, Mushroom Cultivation programme, etc. which will help the poor students to earn and make themselves self-reliant.
9. The college provides Basic Health facility to the students. To address the psychological crisis of the stakeholders, the college has signed a MoU with the Psychiatry departments of Makunda Christian Leprosy and General Hospital, Karimganj District.
10. The introduction of a centre for “Non-Formal Sanskrit Education” sponsored by the central Government is an innovation which is designed to amplify the students’ cultural and linguistic opulence and to acquaint them with our ancient Vedic language.

Institutional Weakness

Ramkrishna College, despite its institutional strengths, however, is not completely free from certain shortcomings or weaknesses, overcoming which will certainly boost its position as a premiere institution of higher education in the state in general and the valley in particular. Its weaknesses comprise the following points.

1. ?The college lacks adequate number of faculties in certain departments such as Philosophy, Sociology, Hindi, Bengali and others which are finding it much difficult to manage large number of students with their limited faculty strength.
2. ?The college lacks Bio Science subjects like Botany, Forestry, etc. Introducing these subjects will definitely enrich the science stream of the college and enable the students with better placement opportunities in addition to widening their horizons of scientific knowledge.
3. It is felt that the college may consider introducing gender-based subjects like Home Science, Fine Arts and Performing Arts which will greatly benefit the students both in terms of skill enhancement and job opportunities.
4. ?The College has not been able to introduce a tour component in its institutional curriculum to enable the students to obtain a practical knowledge of their subjects.
5. ?There is no well-maintained and spacious boys’ common room in the college unlike the girls’ common room.
6. ?The single college bus is not sufficient to accommodate the large number of students coming from the remotest areas. Hence, increasing the number of buses in an absolutely essential requirement for the college.
7. ?The college needs to formalise and regularise it’s remedial coaching classes which are at present held only as short-term classes on the verge of final exams.
8. ?There is no facility of boys’ hostel for the economically underprivileged boy students hailing from remote areas.
9. ?It is increasingly felt that the college needs to introduce an “Earn and Learn Scheme” which can help students to develop their personalities as well as to discover avenues of economic self-sufficiency.

Institutional Opportunity

Ramkrishna Nagar College strives to provide its learners with some unique opportunities to gain intellectual and academic knowledge as well as to develop their co-curricular capacities, so that they can mould themselves into responsible and morally upright citizens of the nation. The opportunities being offered by the college can be summarised as follows:

1. Our college provides an opportunity to the socially and economically underprivileged groups of students hailing from the remotest parts of the district and beyond to receive the facility of higher education.
2. Keeping in view the benefit of the student community, our college holds different periodic activities like Quiz Programmes, Seminars, Debates; Internal Assessment etc. which will give them opportunities for learning and academic improvement.
3. As a means of providing latest facilities to the students, the college has arranged smart class rooms which will enhance the efficacy of the teaching-learning process.
4. For effective learning and co-curricular activities, our college tries to facilitate the students with updated library, common-room, Hostel, Playground, Gymnasium, Yoga Centre etc.
5. Our college has various student clubs, namely Debate, Drama and Music club, Mathematics club, etc. which nurture the creativity of the students and gives them an opportunity to undertake innovative practices.
6. Our college has subscribed to the N-LIST project that provides students with an opportunity to access valuable e-resources through server(s) installed at the INFLIBNET Centre.
7. The college has taken an important initiative to benefit the students by providing Insurance coverage to them on roll through the postal and communication departments, Ramkrishna Nagar Branch.
8. The college arranges several national level seminars and conferences with a view to promote the habit of learning and research among the students and faculties.
9. An important venture that provides an added opportunity to the learners to receive higher education in our college is the inclusion of the study centre of Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University with both UG and PG Courses.

Institutional Challenge

Ramkrishna Nagar College faces several challenges in its path to achieve supreme excellence as a premier institution of higher education at a competitive level. These challenges can be effectively addressed by means of a well-planned and systematic approach formulated from the grass-root level. The challenges faced by the college are multifaceted and of various kinds.

1. Since the majority of the students come from socially and economically underprivileged sections of the population residing in the remotest areas, it is a great challenge to facilitate them with all the academic and co-curricular benefits. As many of these students and their families live by humble means, they may not afford to readily participate in the intellectual discourses and deliberations perpetuated in the institution.
2. The students of the nearby feeder schools are of mostly socially backward sections. As a result, the college is obliged to bear the burden of these students whose academic abilities are compromised as their families are caught in the day to day struggle for economic sustenance.

3. ?The College itself is situated in a geographically remote location, around 55 Kms away from the district headquarter and 17 Kms from the nearest town of Hailakandi. As such, during the heavy rainfalls of monsoons and in times of unpleasant weather condition, the college faces problems of connectivity and communication.
4. ?The College is heavily reliant on state and MLA funds for carrying out its development projects. The management of the college has to think of alternate sources of fund raising from both within and outside the college.
5. ?The College lacks man power both in terms of teaching and non-teaching staff. With its limited number of staff, it is a huge challenge for the college to maintain and augment its academic potentialities.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Keeping its vision and mission in view, Ramkrishna Nagar College college strives to offer quality education & development for all round activities of the students as pre-designed by Assam University, Silchar.

1. At the time of admission, students are guided for choosing suitable subjects for their better future.
2. The time table committee as well as IQAC of the college prepare the time table for regular classes and there after concerned HODs distribute work loads among their departmental teachers
3. The college provides technologically equipped infrastructure and experimental and practical learning through field trips/ survey, educational tours etc.
4. The college library provides access to a vast collection of text books, reference books, story books, national journals, newspaper, e-resources etc.
5. For continuous academic enrichment, the faculty members regularly participate in research activities, faculty development programs etc. Many teachers are also members of various academic committee of the university meant for curriculum development, evaluation process, setting of question paper, moderation on a regular basis.
6. The examination committee along with IQAC of Ramkrishna Nagar College prepare its own academic calendar as per holiday list provided by the Assam University, Silchar. The committee also conducts two internal tests each semester and the internal marks are uploaded to the university web-portal.
7. In addition to its academic credential, the college offers a dedicated certificate / diploma course on Sanskrit learning and computer education.
8. The IQAC of the college emphasizes on the feedback system for faculties, students and employees. The suggestion and opinion given by them are carefully recorded and action taken thereon.
9. Ramkrishna Nagar College has been constantly involved in social development works. The college has different wings & Cells like Student's union, Women Cell, Counseling Cell, NSS, NCC, Eco club etc. which are engaged in different social activities.
10. The college adopted a village namely Chunatigool, P.O- Bidhyanagar T.E. Estate under Ramkrishna Nagar Revenue Circle. The NSS Unit of the college conducts project village survey, Health Camp, Educational Awareness Program etc. to the village Chunatigool. The other village Patiala (Sanskrit Village) is also adopted by the college.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

To impart quality education to the students Ramkrishna Nagar College adopts many diverse methods. The faculty of the college take care very much for a fruitful class various methods are adopted in teaching learning process, Project work is given to the students to develop their skill, Departmental seminars, quiz competitions are organized. College magazines, departmental magazines, wall magazines are published. Students are encouraged to participate in various extra-curricular activities, sports, NCC & NSS. Students are taken into educational tour in important place. For better understanding of the subject the teachers use technology-based teaching and learning tools such as good classroom, Whats-App group, Computer, PowerPoint Presentation etc.

The details of two internal tests to be conducted during the semester course are communicated to the students at the beginning of the semester classes. After the result declaration of internal tests, answer script is shown to the students for their betterment under performed students are asked to discuss their shortcoming with teachers and teachers do their best to find out and resolve the difficulties faced by them. The examination committee takes necessary measures to redress any internal examination related grievance if it is not solved by the department.

The institutions have prepared its program outcome for all academic program. The institution always endeavors to achieve outcome of education, Knowledge, behaviour, values, mortality and capability. All the teacher also tried their level best to make the learners understand the objectives, code of conduct, attendance in class, University system and all other program to be held during the year. Feedback are collected from the students to know the satisfaction level and to adopt the proper way for the attainment of desired outcomes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

In a higher Educational Institution (HEI) Research Innovation and Extension is regarded as one of the important quality indicators. This criterion III is an encomium of the activities carried out for promoting and supporting research, re-counting innovative practices as well as extension activities carried out by the institution during last five years. This criterion looks for information on policies and practices adopted for promoting research culture as well as facilities provided by the institution in this regard. R.K.Nagar College has created a research-centric ambiance with in the campus. The college provides all kinds of facilities and requirement to faculty members for pursuing a good research and to excelling in academic as well as societal realm. The college library is connected with INFLEBNET facilities which are impetus to research work. It gives permission for field work, using of labs etc. for research purpose. The college tries to encourage and stimulate its faculties for organising seminars in the college as well to participate and present papers in other institutions. Many faculties of the college are presenting their research papers in seminar and conferences organized by the institute of national repute.

The college is committed and devoted to serve the localities of its vicinity. Community services acquire prim-facie in the core values of colleges, which is also a major aspect of quality assurance. The College is obliged to engineer a student not simply a degree earner but as a human being with morality as well as with values of humanity. The NSS and NCC wings of the college are involved as catalyst in this regard. The college has three adopted villages. The college tries to in keep with its commitment of social responsibility through extension activities in these villages. Many of the basic needs of these villages are served by extension work. The NSS unit executes extensive services to the community including health, environment sanitation, provision of electricity road and many others. During last five years NSS wing of college has completed over fifty numbers of such services.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Ramkrishna Nagar College, spread over an area of 22.3 acres of land, imparts education in Science and Arts streams. The college has 28 (twenty eight) classrooms or lecture halls which accommodate around 1200 students. The College has fifty computers, two well-maintained science laboratories, two advance computer labs, one seminar hall, one conference hall and seven ICT enabled classrooms. The Hall No. 10 of the college, generally used as an ICT enabled smart classroom, has the provision to be used as an auditorium. The college also has a Yoga Centre, a gymnasium, an open air gym, one Volleyball Court, one Badminton Court, one Lawn Tennis Court, one indoor stadium and a big playground. Besides, the college has a guest house, hostel facilities for girls and its own bus service. The college has a full-fledged and well maintained Central Library which is automated under Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) with SOUL software installed in the year 2018. It has the institutional membership of N-List Programme of UGC INFLIBNET which provides access to more than 30 lakh E-Books, 6000 plus E-journals and other resources. The College Library has more than 8449 books for use of the students and staffs. The Library conducts orientation programme for the newly admitted students. The College Library presently has subscription of 16 (sixteen) number of popular journals and Magazines and 4 (four) number of Daily News Papers. Ramkrishna Nagar College has a good IT facility which has been augmented from time to time. The entire college campus is Wi-Fi enabled with an aim to provide sufficient and uninterrupted internet data to the learners. The Wi-Fi connection in the college was recently updated on 23 June, 2023 with Airtel lease line connection. In addition to it, the college has a pre-existing Bharat Fibre Broad Band connection. The bandwidth of the Wi-Fi is 200 MBPS. The student-computer ratio of the college for the latest completed academic year is 27:1. The amount of expenditure, excluding salary, incurred on maintenance and augmentation of the college infrastructure in the session 2021-22 are Rs. 2988796.58 and Rs. 1807638 respectively.

Student Support and Progression

This criterion deals with efforts made by the institution in providing necessary support to the student in order to acquire a fruitful learning experience in campus. The facilities provided for the holistic development of the students and their progression to higher studies and placements are dealt with in this criterion. It looks into the engagement of the alumni in the development of the institution.

As the college is located in the rural area, the students of economically weaker section is always given priority during admission. Most of the students of various community including SC/ST/OBC/Differently Able students of the college benefited by various scholarship and free ship provided by the State/Central government as well as UGC. During the last five years more than 70% BPL students are benefited by State Government' fee waiver scheme.

The college has undertaken various capacity development and skill enhancement programs during last five years. The college has completed 23 programs on Soft skills, Language skills, Computer techniques, Observation of International Yoga Day, Awareness on Health and Hygiene. Further, the college has organised programs on Career Counselling and Guidance in order to make students aware about their future job opportunities.

During last five years a total number of 988 students have completed their graduation from the college and 36 students have progressed to higher education and 28 students have been placed in different government sectors.

The college has different committees and cells for timely Redressal for students grievances, sexual harassment

and ragging in the campus. Grievances Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell and Women Anti-Harassment Cell are active in the campus and working to create awareness among students and try to solve various issues in a transparent manner. Here, it is also important to mention that during last five years, there were no such cases of harassment and students grievances.

The college organizes various extra-co-curricular sports and cultural activities every year in order to develop leadership as well as all round development of students. The college also celebrates and observe various days of National and International importance. Moreover the Alumni of the college actively involved for the development of the college by involving themselves in various activities and contribution.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision of Ramkrishna Nagar College provides overall development of the society in its social, ethical, spiritual and intellectual perspectives.

Regarding NEP 2020, our college sets mechanism for implementing NEP 2020 from the session 2023-24 for UG courses following the guidelines prepared by the Assam University, Silchar.

Our College has a culture of decentralization and the effective leadership in various institutional practices. The organogram is an administrative diagram of a college which describes the decentralized structure of administration. The college administration is a co-operative effort of Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff, students and other stakeholders for pursuing the common objective.

The welfare measures adopted by the College for teaching and non-teaching staff are followed according to the Assam Gazette notification 2010.

Administration: The college deals all administrative affairs through its own website www.r.k.nagar.college.org. All significant administrative informations are posted in the college website time to time. Further various WhatsApp groups are also utilised for college related affairs.

Examination: The examination process has been maintained through online/offline mode. The process of filling out exam application, getting admit cards, uploading marks etc. is performed also in online mode.

Keeping in view the necessity of Professional development programmes, a number of faculties of our college participated in various professional development programmes every year.

The College has a transparent and well-planned financial management system. The principal serves as Drawing & Disbursing Officer (DDO) of the college and makes all financial transactions as per financial rules of Govt. of Assam and the instruction of the Governing body of the college.

IQAC has been continuing all activities for quality assurance, by adopting various initiatives in the college. The institution reviews teaching learning process as well as the structure and methodologies of operation and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC and records the incremental improvement in various

activities. The principal along with IQAC coordinator constantly look after the performance of mentors/faculties for the benefits of the students.

Response:

1. Keeping in mind the vision and mission of Ramkrishna Nagar College, the college strives to offer quality education and development of all round activities for the students of the locality. Ramkrishna Nagar College is affiliated by Assam University, Silchar, a central university and the curriculum is pre-designed by parent university, Assam University, Silchar. The college is committed to providing holistic development for its students by adopting innovative practices. At the beginning of the every academic session, teacher council meeting is held to discuss and plan the various developmental activities of the college.
2. The time table committee along with IQAC, of the college prepares the time table and after that all HODs of various department prepare their departmental class routines, distribution of work loads in advance of each academic session. All teachers also prepare teacher logbooks for every academic session. IQAC of the college records all activities undertaken by the department for each academic session.
3. For continuous academic enrichment the college teachers regularly participate in research activity, faculty development programs etc. Many teachers are also members of various academic committee of the University meant for curriculum development, Evaluation process, setting of Question Paper, Moderation on a regular basis.
4. The college provides technologically equipped infrastructure, capable of meeting the academic needs of all students. Students are also exposed to experimental and practical learning through field trips, educational tours etc. The college library provides access to a vast collection of Text books, Reference books, Fiction and non-fiction books, National Journals, Newspaper, E-recourses etc. The goals of effective curriculum delivery to all the students is carried through a Robust Mentor-Mentee programs, where each student mentee is assigned a faculty mentor for academic and personal guidance.
5. The college emphasizes on feedback system collected from faculties, students, alumni and employees. The suggestion and opinions given by them are carefully recorded and discussed in the college governing body meeting for follow up action.

1. The Curriculum effectively integrates crosscutting issues relevant to professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and sustainability, and leads to a strong value based development of students by organizing various activities throughout the year as part of the curriculum.
2. Ramkrishna Nagar, College has been constantly involved in social developmental works and to meet this end, the college has different wings and cells like Students Union, Women's Cell, Counseling Cell, NSS (National Service Scheme), NCC (National cadet Corps), Eco Club etc which are engaged in different social activities.
3. At the time of admission, Admission cum Counseling Cell guides the students for choosing suitable subjects for their better future. The college has adopted a village namely Chunatigool, P.O.- Bidhyanagar T.E. State under Ramkrishna Nagar Revenue Circle. The NSS unit of the college conducts project village survey, Health Camp, Educational Awareness programs etc to assess the menstrual health and hygiene of children belonging to the lower Socioeconomic strata of the village Chunatigool. The other Village adopted by the college is Patiala- the SANSKRIT VILLAGE.
4. The college teachers along with the non-teaching staff organized a relief camp for the local villagers during the pandemic. Rice, Oil, and useful food items were distributed door to door. The college staff members along with NSS Unit also organized an Awareness Camp to create consciousness among local people regarding Covid-19. The necessity of social distancing and hand washing, use of sanitizers and masks were emphasised upon. The students were specially trained and motivated as to how to carry on their academic life while addressing to the Covid-19 related safely measures. The NSS unit also made arrangements for cleaning the college campus once in every month and regularly sanitizing the building to minimize the risk of infection during Covid-19.
5. Gender related courses are an integral component of various programs. Student are sensitized and encouraged to work towards equity from a cross-cultural perspective. Moreover Gender is included in the courses of PLSHCC-202 & SOCSEC 401 Under U.G studies (CBCS).
6. The courses on environment studies are included in all UG Programs. Environment Awareness programs, Seminars, Industry visits and Field Trips are organized. The College Beautification committee / Eco Club regularly organizes plantation drive inside the college campus. Lecture and classroom transaction is very important in teaching learning process. Active participation of the students is very important for fruitful class otherwise they will never be able to have deep understanding of the concerned subject. The faculty of the college takes care very much for an effective class. Outside the classes also the teachers help the students in their studies. Students are always allowed to approach the department for solving their educational problems. Various methods are adopted in teaching learning process. These are as follows

1. Project work is given to the students under the guidance of teachers both in Science and Arts streams to develop their skill in experiment and writing.
2. Departmental seminars are organised to improve communication skill and confidence of the students.
3. Quiz competitions are organised among the students.
4. To develop the creativity of the students college magazine, wall magazines are published.
5. Students participate in interdepartmental debate and inter college debate which are very useful for the improvement of the personality and confidence of the students.
6. Group discussions are arranged to promote communication capacity development of ideas.
7. Student attendance in the class is strictly observed.
8. Students are encouraged to participate in various cultural programs, sports, NCC, NSS for their mental and physical development.
9. Students of some departments visit industries, near by villages and places of historical importance . It helps to build bridges between text book knowledge and hands on experience.
10. Students are taken for excursions in various important places as part of accomplishment.
11. Guest faculties are invited from different fields to take classes in respective departments
12. Some Departments of the college has signed memorandum of understanding with other colleges to exchange teachers and students.
13. The college provides hostel facilities and college bus services so that students can attend the classes in proper time without facing any problem.

For the better understanding of the subject and to attract the attention of the students, the college provides various learning management system and teachers also use technology based teaching learning tools. These are as follows:

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Evaluation Process is organized following Rules and Regulations, Academic Calendar of Affiliating University and detail schedule of the College. The examination board convenes meeting with Hod's ,AOC(s) are selected to conduct internal examinations. As per the norms of the University, 20 marks are allotted for each of the internal assessment and 10 marks for attendance. To make the mechanism transparent and vigorous the college follows some procedure which are mentioned below:

- Academic Calendar is uploaded in college website.
- Students are given information about their syllabus, tentative time of internal assessment are assessed in the beginning of their class.
- Details of internal assessment are also displayed in Notice Board.
- The college authority holds a meeting with the HoDs and Staff for the smooth conduct of internal assessment.
- Assignment Topics are discussed in class and probable questions necessary materials are provided to the learners.
- Internal marks are displayed in the Notice Boards to ensure transparency and correctness before they are forwarded to the university
- The Department takes separate exam for those who fail to appear in exam due to some valid unavoidable circumstances.

- Students are allowed to report their grievances, if any, with regard to evaluation in internal assessment examination.
- The students are given information regarding their percentage of attendance and extra classes are taken to make up attendance who are unable to secure 75% attendance.

Mechanism to solve the problems of the students regarding Internal Assessment

- To meet the complaints and grievances if any regarding the Internal Assessment examination the college tries its level best to maintain explicit transparency. First the College authority deals with the problems and communicate with University if required.
- Every department displays the marks obtained by each student . Marks of in internal assessment are displayed within a short period of 10 to 15 days.
- The departments conduct separate examinations for those students who fail to appear in exams due to some legitimate problems.
- The students can obtain their evaluated answer script to find out their limitations and short coming and there by stive for imporvement.

During the last five years, The R.K. Nagar college at the aegis of Research and Extension cell NSS and NCC wing of the college as well as Women Cell have conducted many extension activities with

Voluntary Blood Donation and Health checkup camps, outreach campaign, sensitization and awareness programme on gender and feminine issues, awareness programme on Environment, Health, Climate Change. These two wings observed various national and international days viz; World Environment day, International day for Biological Diversity, World AIDS day, International Yoga day, World Hand Wash day, Anti/ No Tobacco Day, National Voters Day as well as International Women's day etc.

The NSS unit has also adopted a remote village of the locality, based on functional and pressing need of the inhabitants and regularly conducting and monitoring various activities in the adopted village with close co-ordination and co-operation from village populace. The NSS volunteers rendered their services in construction and repairing of village roads, conducting socio-economic survey on door to door basis, organizing awareness campaign on Basic Health-Hygiene and cleanliness along with literacy awareness programme.

Basing on socio-economic survey reports, the NSS wing also highlights various pressing needs of basic amenities the villagers such as electricity connection; drinking water facilities and has taken up these issues with public representative and appropriate government authorities for taking immediate steps for resolving these basic developmental needs of the villagers. Established in the year 1964, Ramkrishna Nagar College has gradually augmented its infrastructure and learning resources over the years to achieve its goal of imparting best education to the students hailing from different parts of the Karimganj district as well as from the state of Mizoram. The College campus is spread over an area of 22.3 acres of land. The college imparts education in Science and Arts streams, offering subjects like Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics in Science stream and Economics, Philosophy, Sociology, Political Science, History, Bengali, Hindi, Sanskrit and English in Arts stream.

1. Classrooms:

At present there are 28 (twenty eight) classrooms or lecture halls, with white board in each classroom, which accommodate around 1200 students. There are a total of 431 desks and benches and 25 chairs and tables in all the class rooms. During the session 2021-22, one smart classroom with a big LCD television had been added to enable systematic and learner friendly imparting of lessons.

1. Laboratories:

The College has two well-maintained science laboratories for providing first hand scientific experiments to the students. Around 40 (forty) students can be accommodated for scientific learning at a time in the laboratories.

2. There are 10 printers and 8 scanners in the College.
3. The smart classroom with a big LCD television is a part of the IT infrastructure of the college which renders great assistance in imparting lessons to the students in a systematic and learner-oriented way.
4. The Library has the infrastructure of a fully automated system under Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) with SOUL software installed in the year 2018. OPAQUE facility in ILMS software and institutional membership of N-List Programme of UGC INFLIBNET are additional supports to the IT Infrastructure of the College.
5. The entire college campus is Wi-Fi enabled with an aim to provide sufficient and uninterrupted internet data so that learners can access academic e-resources, intellectual domains and study related online materials.
6. The Wi-Fi connection in the college was recently updated on 23 June, 2023 with Airtel lease line connection. In addition to it, the college has a pre-existing Bharat Fibre Broad Band connection. Teaching Staff: Teaching staff imparts teaching, guidance and mentors the academic, extra-curricular activities & overall development of the institution.

IQAC: The IQAC prepares & implements policy & sets quality benchmark for various activities of the college.

Various Committees are formed, with the representatives of teaching, non-teaching and student members, to help the administration in different functional areas.

The Teaching members are recruited as per the guidelines issued by the Director, Higher Education, Government of Assam. These rules are in compliance with the UGC rules. The non-teaching employees are recruited as per the rules framed by the Government of Assam.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The welfare measures adopted by the College for teaching and non-teaching staff are as follows: -

1. **Group Insurance Scheme (GIS):** It is scheme of the Govt of Assam to guarantee insurance cover to its employee. Monthly premium under the scheme is deducted by the concerned Treasury that releases salary to the staff of the college.
2. **Duty Leave:** Duty Leave to serve as Resource Person to attend seminar, conference, RCs, OCs

etc.

3. **GPF:** Government provident fund (GPF) is a government managed retired savings scheme.
4. **OPS:** Old pension scheme is for the employees who has joined prior to 2005 and new pension scheme (**NPS**) is available for the later.
5. **Gratuity:** It is one-time payment given to staff as per Govt. rules.
6. **Casual Leave:** It is provided to both teaching and non-teaching employees of the College as per Govt. rules.
7. **Earned Leave:** It is there for the teaching and non-teaching employees. However, the number of days provided for teaching and non-teaching employees are different.
8. **Child Care Leave (CCL):** CCL is provided to the female employees of the College who are mothers and have to look after their child.
9. **Maternity Leave:** This leave is provided to the female employees of the College.
10. **Infrastructural Facilities:** Departmental rooms are arranged for all the teaching departments & well-furnished administrative building is available for the non-teaching staff. Separate Toilets for Male & Female Staff, CC Camera in the academic building, Car Parking Shed, Water Purifiers, Generator are available in the college campus. Membership of N-List. Books & Journal in Library. Residential facility for the chowkidar & night-guard.
11. **Safe Drinking water facility:** There is arrangement of safe drinking water and cold drinking water in summer session for all staff.
12. **Canteen:** The canteen (**Annapurna**) of the college provides good quality of food to all staff on demand and also maintain its quality, cleanliness, hygienic condition.
13. **Gymnasium and Sports:** The Gym and sports facilities are provided to all.

Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff.

The performance appraisal system is available in the CAS promotion. Depending on the reports from the various superiors in the institutional hierarchy, the Principal issues appraisal report through IQAC Coordinator. The scrutiny committee scrutinizes the promotion proposal of the incumbent. Then, IQAC Coordinator recommends the promotion proposal to the Principal. Then, with the recommendation from the University, a departmental promotion committee (DPC) is formed for final scrutiny. Promotion of faculty members are recommended which is based on the API score as reflected in the proforma. The authority takes corrective measures of those faculties & staff whose performance is found unsatisfactory.

For non-teaching staff, the indicators of performance are efficiency and time bound completion of tasks assigned to them. The principal maintains Annual Confidential Report of all Non-Teaching staff & their promotion depend on this report. Annual Confidential Report of each employee is forwarded to the Director of Higher Education along with Departmental Promotion Committee Report.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources

A Transparent financial management system is maintained by the college in which the government funds and UGC funds are main sources of funds. But our college has not received any fund from any other agencies during the last five financial year. So, the college has to mobilizes the resources generated from the students' fees to fulfil the other requirements. The governing body co-ordinates and monitors the optimal utilization of funds for the promotion of learners centric eco system. Funds are basically provided to meet the infrastructural requirement of the institution.

The procurement and utilization of funds are subject to regular internal audits and external audits being managed by the Government of Assam which acts as checks and balances. It is a reality that the amount generated has not been sufficient to meet its growing requirement. The governing body puts much effort to mobilize fund from external sources and prepare proposal to ensure timely utilization of funds.

Although the college tries to mobilize fund from all possible sources, the amount of fund generated has not been sufficient to meet its growing requirement. Taking into

account the limitations of the college to mobilize sufficient fund from its internal sources, efforts are being made to mobilize fund from external sources. Various committees have been formed by the Governing Body not only to prepare proposal but also to ensure timely utilization of fund.

Financial audits

The College has a transparent and well-planned financial management system. The Principal serves as Drawing & Disbursing Office (DDO) of the college and the Principal makes financial transaction as per financial rules of Govt. of Assam. Accordingly, internal and external financial audits are carried out.

The college maintains expenditures of various heads under the supervision of senior faculty members. The administrative staff keep the record by verifying the required documents.

The internal audit is conducted by hired Registered Chartered Accountant at the end of each financial year undertaken by **DEY DUTTA**, Charter Accountant, Partner in-charge Kaushik Ranjan Dey, B. Com (H), FCA, ACMA, DISA, Address: Bipin Paul Road, Karimganj-788711 (Assam). The fund received under various schemes are audited separately. The salary for all staff of the college is maintained by FIN Assam.

As the Internal Audit is conducted by hired Registered Chartered Accountant at the end of each financial year. Income and Expenditure Account, Receipts and Payments Account, and Balance Sheet are thoroughly audited as on 31st March of every year. The Internal Audit, being concurrent in nature, points out the various anomalies, if detected, throughout the year. The Internal audit verifies all the documents with the accounting records maintained by the College office. The Audit Report is placed annually in the Governing Body meeting and the audit objections, if any, are discussed there. The Governing Body tries to meet the objections and recommends rectifications to the principal, upon which the principal acts.

Ramkrishna Nagar College was accredited by NAAC first in the year 2004 with B Grade and till then the IQAC along with college authority is working to fulfil the recommendation of NAAC but initiatives undertaken by the college authority resulted no prominent solution for many years. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College has taken repeated initiatives for reassessment but due to various administrative shortcomings and sudden demise of coordinator and repeated change of coordinator the process of reassessment is delayed.

In stead of all these difficulties IQAC has continued for quality assurance by adopting various

initiatives which resulted good result.

A Few initiatives are: -

1. Teacher's Diary.
2. Energy consumption was reduced by replacing bulb by LED throughout the campus.
3. Environment friendly campus is maintained in and around the college with plantation of many valuable trees.
4. Use of plastic within the campus is reduced by creating awareness among the students through NSS and NCC.
5. Tobacco free campus is maintained and campaigning on "Say No Ragging".
6. To encourage the students for publishing departmental magazine of each department and college magazine of the college.
7. Along with the academic activities, IQAC took initiative to develop social awareness regarding Covid 19. Arrangement for survey of five nearby villages by faculty members was made follow the guidelines of DHE.
8. To develop nationalism among the students, Parakram Divas, commemorating 125th birth anniversary of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose was celebrated.
9. National Voters Day and training was also arranged to develop awareness among students.
10. To develop the educational scenario of adjacent backward areas of the society specially of the adopted village (Chunatigul), different activities were organised.
11. Mentors are allocated to provide guidance, advice, feedback, and support to all the mentee, serving variously as role model depending on the specific goals and objectives negotiated with the mentee.

Above all, to improve the quality education and for exchange of Teachers and taught, IQAC Cell signed MoU with West Silchar College, Borjatrapur, Cachar and Swami Vivekananda college, Chandkhira.

The institution reviews its teaching learning process at periodic intervals through IQAC

The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structure and methodologies of operation and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC and records the incremental improvement in various activities. The Principal along with IQAC coordinator constantly look after classes for active participation of mentors/faculty for the benefits of the students.

During the pandemic, the world faced Covid 19. There was a complete lock down and regular classes could not be provided to the students. To keep the students involved in the teaching-learning process, arrangements of online classes were made through Google meet, Zoom meet, video classes and also through Whats-app as per suggestion from university as well as from Govt. SOP but online classes could not serve the required expectation of the students. The internal examinations were held by way of submission of projects, Assignments or through the only unit test they appeared (whichever is applicable). The University Examination was conducted by a special committee viz Exam Cell under the supervision of Officer in-charge of the College.

Looking at the changing perspectives of life and women's role in developing the society, our college being a co-educational Institute and a hub of higher education encompassing a large area, has been taking sincere measures to maintain gender equity and to sensitize the students as well as the community. The college has organized different events related to the same every year during 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22.

In regards to gender sensitization, our college provides equal opportunity and scope to the students of all genders to participate in various co-curricular activities like Annual Sports, debate competition, educational excursion etc. organized by the college.

The Institution has undertaken a very innovative step towards gender equity and sensitization by adopting village and educating the village community about the necessity of eradication of gender discrimination.

The Gender Audit has been a regular practice in our College which is performed in a periodic way. The Women Cell of the college conducts periodic Audit through students survey, analyses their problems and recommends some appropriate measures to the concerned authority.

In order to assure safety and security of Women in the college, the entire college premises including Girl's Hostel, Girl's Common Room, Class Room is kept under CCTV Surveillance. Apart from these, Security Guards are deployed at the entry and exit points.

The College has separate Girls Common Room equipped with Washroom, Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine and study corner.

There is a Women study Center in the College premises which helps to develop spiritual as well as intellectual faculties of the girls students and staff.

The College has Career Guidance Cell as well as a Counseling cell that makes the girl students aware about their scope of jobs and self-establishment keeping apart the issue of gender discrimination in regards to self establishment. The Counseling Cell focuses the girl Students to meet the hardship of life in a patriarchal society. The cell motivates them to raise their voice against any kind of abuses meted by

them.

The Grievance Redressal Cell of the college takes every measure to mitigate the grievances of the girl students, so that they do not feel in secured inside the Campus.

The Anti Ragging Cell keeps strict vigilance to ensure the well being of the New-comers of the college, specially the girl students in order to avert any kind of abuse.

The college gives paramount importance to the Health and Well-being of the students. The Health care Centre of the college plays a vital role in this regard.

Moreover, with a view to address the Psychological issues of the students, a MoU has been enacted with the Psychiatry department of Makunda Christian Leprosy and General Hospital, Karimganj District. The college hires professional Counselor to address the same.

The college ensures equal participation of female member in each and every committee for maintaining gender equality. In relation to this, the Mentor-Mentee groups of the college take active measures to view the problem faced by the girl students and to find adequate measures to resolve the issues.
